Bombay Hook Visitor Center Nearing Completion

As the finishing touches are added to the new Bombay Hook Visitor Center, staff, volunteers, and visitors are itching to get inside. While most of the work will be completed in the next few weeks, we are waiting on one huge thing before we officially move in, furniture!

The furniture is being ordered, and once the order is complete, it will take approximately 12-16 weeks for manufacturing, shipping, and installation. We hope this means we can officially move in and have a soft opening this summer. One important thing to remember is that supply chain issues still haven't been fully resolved by the pandemic, and there's always a chance for the project to be delayed a little further. While we're all anxiously awaiting that move-in date, we plan to enjoy this building for years to come, and the wait will be worth it in the end.

Our contract for exhibit development was just recently awarded, so the next step for the Visitor Center will be to develop exhibits for the entry hall, vestibule, and multipurpose room. We anticipate the exhibit projects will be completed and installed in a year or so. The opening of the building isn't dependent on the exhibits being complete.



Pee Dee National Wildlife Refuge By BJL



In early November 2022, my wife Joanne and I took a day trip to Pee Dee National Wildlife Refuge across the South Carolina state line near Wadesboro, North Carolina. Pee Dee NWR is situated along the upper section of the Pee Dee River in North Carolina. This 8,500-acre refuge comprises various habitats, including bottomland hardwoods, pine forests, mixed hardwood/pine, cropland, wetlands, and open water. The refuge was established in

1963 to provide important fall and winter migratory waterfowl

habitat opportunities.

Peak fall foliage colors were about to unfold during our visit. As first-timers at Pee Dee, we took the opportunity to explore the wildlife drive and use its northern network



of refuge roads. There were lots of habitats in the large refuge impoundment. The wet-

lands vegetation was still in an impressive amount of bloom.

Pee Dee offers some excellent birding spots. We observed a nice mix of fall warblers and migrant songbirds working the hardwood forest edge. The early waterfowl migrants were using the impoundment. Finally, we walked a bottom hardwood for-

est trail that produced a nice mix of woodpeckers, especially Pileated Woodpeckers vocalizing and crossing our trail. We had a great visit and came away with some nice pics.

Walking through this Pee Dee River habitat of bottom forest and thickets was a bit surreal. I caught myself watching and listening for the ghosts of Bachman's Warbler. Pee Dee was once home to that never-abundant Bachman's Warbler (*Vermivora bachmanii*). The last accepted sightings of this small, yellow-faced, black-throated bird were in 1988 and 2001. It is now believed by many to be extinct. In the early 1980s, John Janowski, myself, and other twitchers were trying to break free and chase this bird.

Is there still a tiny undiscovered population out there? Maybe only for those who believe. From Pee Dee NWR to nearby

Waccamaw NWR, down to Awendaw by Cape Romain NWR, these are all integral parts of a larger watershed you'll enjoy exploring. If you hear a strange Northern Parula, especially in early spring, get on it! (*Photos by BJL*)





Daily Fee and Annual Pass News: Digital Payments Coming Soon!

Josh Smith, our Visitors Services Manager, Coastal Delaware NWR Complex, has shared exciting news on future Refuge entrance fees and annual Refuge passes.

All too often, visitors arrive at the Refuge and are disappointed to learn that we can only accept cash or checks for passes. That problem will soon be remedied. We are partnering with <u>Recreation.gov</u> to establish several new methods for visitors to pay the daily fees or to purchase a Bombay Hook NWR Annual Pass. The new system is expected to go live sometime in April and will allow visitors to purchase passes online in advance or through the <u>Recreation.gov</u> app. Another option will be "Scan and Pay," which allows visitors to scan a QR code with their smart device and pay digitally.

Interagency passes will still be available and, for the time being, will remain cash or check only. We hope to be able to accept credit cards for them also in the near future.

We will keep everyone posted as these new payment options are rolled out and become available.

Damselflies (Suborder: Zygoptera)

- Are commonly seen on the Refuge from May through September.
- Are often confused with larger, stronger, and more powerful dragonflies.



- Damselflies are slower and graceful in their flight.
- They have long, thin, very slender bodies.
- Damselflies come in various vivid colors and shades of green, black, and blue.
- Males typically are brighter colored, while females are plainer and harder to identify.
- They have delicate wings of the same size and shape and fly slower than dragonflies.

 With few exceptions, damselflies rest with their wings together and above their bodies while dragonflies rest with their wings spread apart.

- Damselflies have eyes spaced far apart, unlike dragonflies with large, close-set eyes.
- Damselflies are flying insect predators, eating mosquitoes and other small insects.
- Damselflies are typically found around freshwater habitats.
- Adults lay their eggs near water; these eggs hatch and live in water as larvae.
- Damselfly larvae forage on insects, molt, and emerge from the water as adults.
- The needs of dragonflies are essentially the same as damselflies.
- Threats to damselflies are poor water quality and loss of forest habitat.
- Damselflies fall prey to birds, frogs, fish, water insects, dragonflies, and other damselflies.

Direct your binoculars towards the damselflies next time you're at the Refuge.

Spring 2023 Calendar of Events

<u>VARIOUS DAYS: May through June 2023</u> Purple Martin Nest Checks (11:00 a.m. to 11:45 a.m.) - Joël Martin will perform weekly Purple Martin gourd nest checks during April, May, and June. Individuals can observe and assist with recording data, counting eggs and hatchlings, and after they hatch hold a chick. You will see birds that spent the winter in Brazil and you may see an adult sitting on a nest. The nests need to be checked quickly to make sure the Purple Martins are not disturbed for a long period of time. Meet at the Visitor Center on the following dates: May 5, 10, 15, 19, 24, 29, June 2, 7, 12, 16, 21, 26, 30.

<u>Saturday, May 6, 2023</u> <u>Warbler Walk</u> (8:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m.) – The walk will be on one or two trails along the Wildlife Drive with expert birders Eileen McLellan and Terry Willis. This will be an excellent way to practice what you learned at the Warbler Program the day before or for anyone who wants to look for warblers.

<u>Saturday May 13, 2023 Beginning Birding: Shorebird Program</u> (9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon) - Eileen McLellan and Terry Willis will give a presentation about shorebirds, their amazing migrations, and simple identification techniques. After the presentation, participants will take the bus to the impoundments to practice their new skills. The presentation is open to unlimited participants. The bus is limited to 14 participants, preregistration is required to reserve your spot. Any un-reserved spots will be available on the day of the event. Call (302) 653-9345 to register.

Saturday, May 20, 2023

- Bird Identification Station (8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.) Get a close look at the different bird species in the impoundments. Randy Murphy will be set up on the Wildlife Drive with scopes and binoculars to help you identify shorebirds, wading birds, and whatever else flies by. Look for the blue ID Station sign along the Auto Tour Route.
- Monarch Presentation and Gardening Tips for Monarchs (2:00 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.) Learn how to identify monarch butterflies and about their migration. Participants will learn about their habitat requirements and gardening tips to attract butterflies. Come learn about the amazing monarch and how you can help them survive. While monarchs will be the main focus, other local butterflies and pollinators will be included.

<u>Sunday, May 21, 2023</u> Horseshoe Crab Life History and Ecology by Brandi Besecker (10:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.) - Learn about one of the planets oldest migrations as we discuss the fascinating story of the Horseshoe Crab, and its critical role for both people and wildlife. We'll then take an excursion to Woodland Beach to get a close look at these prehistoric creatures. High tide at Woodland Beach is 12:08 p.m.

<u>Saturday, June 3, 2023</u> <u>Photo Workshop</u> (2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.) - Join wildlife and landscape photographer Terry Willis for a Wildlife/Nature Photography Workshop. Learn how to optimize your camera for photographing wildlife and landscapes. In this workshop we will discuss camera settings, and how to go beyond the "Auto" setting on your digital camera. We will also begin to delve into editing your photos using software like Adobe Photoshop, beginning with the raw image and proceeding to the final version suitable for printing or using on the web.
