BIRD NOTES

Spring Period March through May 2013

The spring period serves as both a principle migratory period as well as the period during which most species begin nesting activities. Weather for these months is normally highly

variable and this report period was no exception. Rainfall was evenly distributed and below the long term average for each month during the report period. A coastal storm ushered in March (3/06) with high winds (30-35 mph sustained with gusts to 50 mph). However, rainfall from that event was light. A high temperature of 84°F was recorded as early as 4/09 with a low of 30°F recorded on 5/14. Ospreys made their spring arrival during early March just as most migratory Canada Geese were departing for northern climes; shorebirds passed through the area with population peaks for most species occurring in May. Passerine species arrived throughout the report period with peaks by many northern nesting species occurring during early May. Remnant numbers of Snow Geese (up to 300 birds) were still evident in early April, while Shovelers and Green-Winged Teal remained abundant within the impoundments through April. Bombay Hook's Turkey population seems to be increasing as sightings were very common throughout the report period in the upland areas. Bombay Hook remains one of the few areas in the state of Delaware where visitors can hear and see Bobwhite Quail on a regular basis. State and region declines of this resident bird are not reflected in the thriving populations of these species at Bombay Hook. According to Anthony Gonzon, Delaware Fish & Wildlife, the active bald eagle nest at Bombay Hook produced one fledgling eaglet.

Reported Sightings

Following are a collection of selected bird observations reported from Bombay Hook NWR during the report period. Sources of information include bird observation sheets by refuge visitors, internet postings of refuge sightings such as Birdline Delaware, data collected by state and federal biologists, as well as personal observations and communications. I urge refuge visitors to post their observations on either the sheets or on the E-Bird Tracker in the Visitor Center. I

have grouped the reported observations by week throughout the spring period. grouped the observations by land features (in bold type) when specific locations are included with the reports, such as pool name or field location.

The Refuge Store is headed for a record-setting year. The store provides much of the income and of the expense for Friends of Bombay Hook. A record year means that more of our members and visitors are spending more money when they visit. Bombay Hook Visitor Center is open Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. year round. The Visitor Center will reopen on weekends beginning September 7, 2013. <u>The Allee House is in need of repairs and is closed until further notice</u>. Check the Website for additions or changes.

<u>Saturday, September 7, 2013</u> - Volunteer Opportunities at Bombay Hook (10:00 a.m. – 12:30 p.m.) A meeting about volunteer opportunities will be held in the auditorium. To protect wildlife and their habitat and to provide the best opportunities in wildlife observation and photography, it is important not to disturb, injure, or damage plants and animals of the refuge. In fact, it is a prohibited act as stated in 50 CFR27.51. This disturbance includes flushing birds and other wildlife or using electronic calls (taping) to lure birds closer for observation or photography. Please remember to take only memories and photographs and leave only footprints.


