BRD NetTFS Rainfall during October and November was less than normal and pool levels, although generally good for shorebirds were less than optimal for newly arriving waterfowl. Fortunately, December and January saw levels rise and made food more available for feeding ducks. Populations in Shearness Pool increased significantly during that period although num-

bers of Pintails and Green-winged Teal in that unit did not appear to reach those of recent years. Temperatures remained mild during December and January with the exception of about six days when temperatures remained below freezing. Ice cover never lasted long and pools remained open. One six-inch snowfall represented the total snowfall for the winter to date.

Bald Eagles all over Delmarva are becoming much more abundant. Eagle pairs constructed two new nests this Fall on Bombay Hook NWR. Both nests are easily observed by Refuge visitors along the Auto Tour route. One nest is on George's Island (the wooded hummock in the tidal marsh east of Raymond Pool) and the other is located on the island in the northwest portion of Raymond Pool. There are other nests located both on and off Refuge property which should provide plenty of Eagle observation opportunities for Refuge visitors during the next few months.

Tundra Swans were present in the three major Refuge impoundments from late November until the end of the period when nearly 300 birds were present. The first Snow Geese were reported during late September when a few birds dribbled in. By early October, 200 birds were present. One thousand birds were recorded by early November with larger numbers by early December. The population continued to increase on the Refuge into January when groups of 5,000 birds plus were normally present on the Refuge during some portion of the day. Ross's Geese, Cackling Geese, and a group of 8-9 Greater White-fronted Geese were frequently reported throughout the report period after early November. A Brant was reported in early November and a Eurasian Wigeon was sighted during the last week of December. A female Redhead was seen during January when Common Mergansers made their presence known for the winter period.

Marbled Godwits were sighted each month of the report period. Hudsonian Godwits were reported into December. Avocets were sighted each month and varied from a few birds to 650 (November). Visitors were treated to a good variety during October and November with some huge concentrations of mixed species in Money Marsh during low tide and Raymond Pool (high tide). Species encountered during that period included Black-bellied Plover, a few Golden Plovers, Semi-palmated Plovers, Stilt Sandpipers, White-rumped Sandpipers, Least Sandpipers, and Yellowlegs (both).

A White Ibis was seen during late October. grine Falcons were present during much of the period, in particular October and November when they

harassed arriving waterfowl and shorebirds in the impoundment and over the saltmarsh. Red-Hawks, shouldered Redtails, Merlin, Kestrel, Harriers, Longeared Owls as well Short-ears and Barn Owls were recorded. A Lesser Black-backed Gull was observed in November and December. Red-headed

Woodpeckers were reported along the Boardwalk Trail in early October. A Pileated Woodpecker was reported in Finis Woods in October and December. A Yellow-headed Blackbird was recorded during November.

Starting the Year Right With the Bird Club



On January 1, the Friends' Bird Club enjoyed its annual field trip to the Indian River Inlet area

and Silver Lake in Rehoboth. The group started at the Indian River marina, went over to the Inlet and then headed north to Rehoboth. All told, they saw about 30 species including Surf Scoters, Long-tailed Ducks, Red-throated Loons, a Harbor Seal swimming under the bridge, and the famous Silver Lake Canvasbacks. The Inlet waters were extremely calm, temperatures were in the 50s and there was very little wind -- a rare day for January 1.

Thanks to other birders along the way, the group learned where to find two recently reported rarities: an Ash-throated Flycatcher and a Crested Caracara. There had been considerable buzz on the birding networks about the two species, so everyone was excited to see them. The Caracara provided great views by flying between nearby trees and going to the ground to eat.

Two weeks later, Bird Cub members went to Eastern Neck National Wildlife Refuge near Rock Hall, MD, for a private tour. They especially enjoyed the sunshine and the birds by Shipyard Creek. Highlights included three Sapsuckers interacting just up the trail, along with both White-breasted and Brown-headed Nuthatches. In total, 34 species of birds were recorded over a three-hour period.

Spring 2017 Calendar of Events

Saturday, March 4, 2017

- Volunteer Orientation (10:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.) A meeting about volunteer opportunities will be held in the auditorium. The meeting will cover volunteer opportunities and upcoming activities, with the latter part of the session being a tour of the Refuge. Individuals are needed to staff the Visitor Center on weekends and weekdays from March through June. Volunteers are also needed to provide Environmental Education programs for school groups, conduct Refuge tours, provide trail and landscaping maintenance, and help with highway cleanups. April 11, 2017 to April 21, 2017 Delaware State's Waterfowl and Trout Stamp Contest (Auditorium during 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.) - Delaware's Waterfowl and Trout Stamp contest is sponsored by the Division of Fish and Wildlife, DNREC. After the contest the artwork from the waterfowl and trout stamp contest will be on display at Bombay Hook's auditorium. The winning artwork is reproduced on a stamp which must be carried by most hunters and anglers. They are also purchased by collectors and conservationists. The funds from the State Duck Stamp sales are used for waterfowl conservation and funds from the Trout Stamp are used to purchase trout for stocking in selected streams around the state.

Saturday, May 27, 2017 The Shorebird and Horseshoe Crab Connection Presentation (10:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.) - Greg Breese, Project Manager for the Delaware Bay Estuary Project, will start the program with a presentation on shorebirds, their amazing migration journey, and Horseshoe Crabs on the Delaware Bay. The Red Knot, a robin-sized shorebird was designated as threatened under the Endangered Species Act on December 9, 2014. A "threatened" designation means a species is at risk of becoming endangered throughout all or a significant portion of its range. After the presentation, the group will go to Pickering Beach to see Horseshoe Crabs that come up onto the Bay beach to spawn. If we are lucky we will see shorebirds as well, bring binoculars and spotting scopes if you have them. NOTE: High tide is at 11:49 a.m. and we will plan to be on the beach for about an hour around high tide. Meet at the Refuge's auditorium. Space is limited. To protect wildlife and their habitat and to provide the best opportunities in wildlife observation and photography, it is important not to disturb, injure, or damage plants and animals of the Refuge. In fact, it is a prohibited act as stated in 50 CFR27.51.
