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Fishing Permitted at Pasture Point Pond

With a new floating dock, rest station, picnic tables, and expanded parking area, Pasture Point Pond is now open for fishing. It is a catch -and-release pond using artificial lures only. The pond was recently stocked with largemouth bass, bluegills, channel cats, and flathead minnows. Much of the pond is very shallow, and the back flats will dry up in dry summers; however, there are some deep holes around the floating dock. This freshwater body of water will test your fishing skills.

Artist Spotlight: Harold Van Dyck



Harold Van Dyck was a native Delawarean and lived in Clayton, Delaware. He passed away a year ago at the age of 87. He carved and painted shorebirds in the "smoothie style." It's been said his shorebirds were "stylized with position and attitude." Growing up, hunting and fishing the saltmarshes along the Delaware, he crossed paths with accomplished carvers like Harold Haman of Middletown. Killdeer, Snowy Plover, Black Bellied Plover, Red Knot, and Avocet are just a few of the species Harold carved and painted.

Harold carved shorebirds for over 40 years, and his carvings are known both locally and nationally. He visited Bombay Hook NWR, where he observed feeding shorebirds and gained inspiration for his artwork. If you're a long-time visitor to Bombay Hook, you might remember Harold displaying his carvings under the large white tent at a shorebird festival.

To see more of his work, Harold's wife Terry said the Dupont Nature Center has an excellent display of some of Harold's carved and painted shorebirds.

Dolomedes Spiders (Dolomedes spp.)



- Spiders in the genus *Dolomedes* are known as fishing spiders.
- ◆ They are commonly called fishing spiders, wharf spiders, or dock spiders.
- These are giant spiders and very scary looking!
- ◆ Ask a fisherman; they'll say as big as their palm (not a fish tale).
- ♦ But they are shy and run from people; bites are rare, like a bee sting.
- ♦ Not a problem generally unless you are sensitive to spider venom.
- Most species are semiaquatic and
- hunt for prey on the water surface.
 In the water, they tran an air bubble in their body bairs to breathe
- ◆ In the water, they trap an air bubble in their body hairs to breathe while diving.
- Dolomedes spiders are ambush hunters, eating aquatic insects and small fish.
- Waiting at the water's edge, they often sprint across its surface to subdue their prey. Using the water tension, the fishing spider stays on the water.
- Susceptible leg hairs help them ID the water surface vibrations and identify a fallen bug instead of a fallen leaf on the water surface.
- Fishing spiders are nocturnal, feeding at night when most birds are asleep.
- Females wrap their eggs in a silk pouch, work a web around and guard them.
- Many Dolomedes spiders have white stripes on each side of their body.
- ♦ They look like wolf spiders, but this is a water environment.
- The species *Dolomedes tenebrous*, the dark fishing spider, is often seen in wooded areas.
- Watch for these spiders at Bombay Hook NWR in the summer months. (All Photos by BL)





Ethical Wildlife Watching

Paul Daly, a past Bombay Hook Refuge Manager, wrote about "Ethical Wildlife Watching" in his 1996 Manager's Corner. The practices (below) he requested of visitors nearly 30 years ago are still an essential message to our visitors today.

- ☑ Observe "closed area" signs.
- ☑ Stay on designated trails and roads.
- ☑ Keep to posted speed limits.
- ☑ Consider other observers.
- ☑ Do not approach wildlife.
- ✓ Use binoculars and scopes.
- ☑ Keep noise to a minimum.
- ☑ Encourage others to do the same.



Traveling along the southern part of Lake Erie to Oak Harbor, OH, you will come across Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge. The refuge was established in 1961 and protects wetlands, grasslands, and forests for migratory birds, resident wildlife, and some en-Combined dangered species. with other complex refuges, it covers about 10,000 acres.

This was our second trip to the area, and we were not disappointed! We decided to travel in May during the local bird festival. Along with its neighbor, Magee Marsh, the refuge was loaded with warblers and other migratory birds along the Atlantic Flyway. There were so many marshes, parks, and birding

spots; we couldn't explore them all in a three-day trip! We walked trails, drove the wildlife drive, shopped in the Friends of Ottawa gift shop, and enjoyed the special events for the birding weekend.

You can see up to 38 varieties of spring warblers, 30 species of shorebirds, and many other migratory birds in the spring.

If you can, visit this magical area, we encourage you to do so around mid-May. You will surely be amazed!

2023 Bombay Hook NWR Headquarters **Deer Hunts**

The Refuge will be closed on three dates for a headquarters deer hunt this fall.

That's correct; it's closed to the public for visits. Please mark your calendar.

Those dates are the following:

- October 11 Muzzleloader
- November 15 Shotgun
- **December 13 Antlerless**

Please understand that, as in years past, the Fischer Tract, Steamboat Landing, and other designated areas at the Refuge will have active hunting activities throughout the fall. Hunting brochures are available at the Visitor Center detailing these activities and specific related regulations.

Watch for the opening of the **new Bombay Hook NWR trail!** It's approximately 2 miles in length and soon will be in beautiful fall colors.




SPECIAL SUMMER VISITORS
